



### Appendix 3 Product End-of-Life Disassembly instructions

**Purpose:** The document is intended for use by end-of-life recyclers or treatment facilities. It provides the basic instructions for the disassembly of HP products to remove components and materials requiring selective treatment.

#### 1.0 Items Requiring Selective Treatment

1.1 Items listed below are classified as requiring selective treatment.

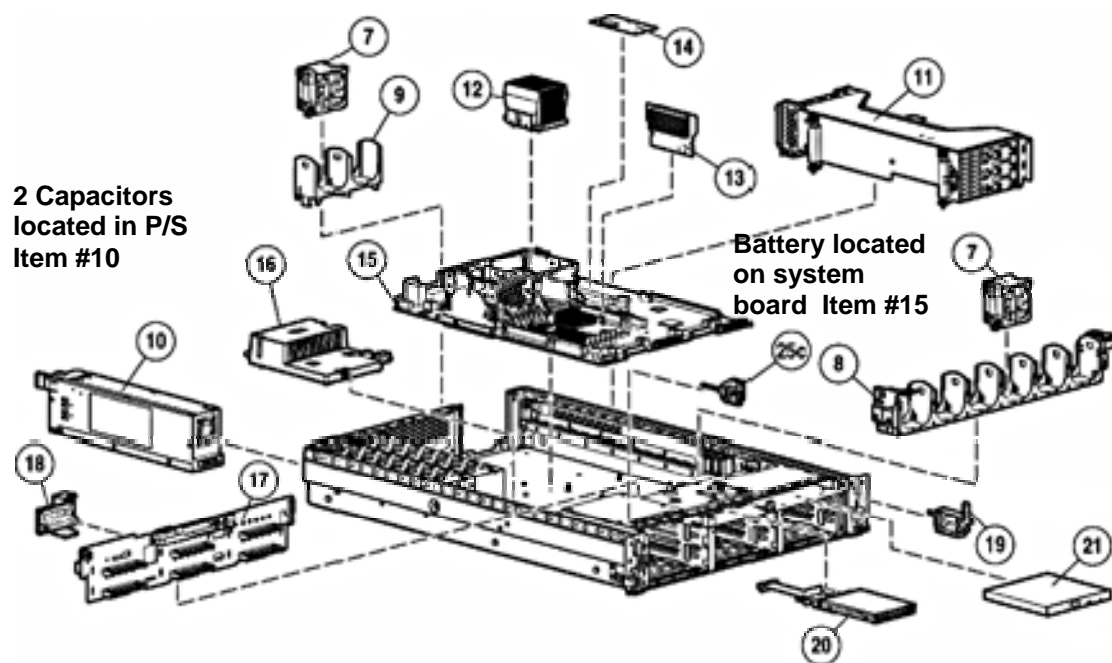
## 3.0 Product Disassembly Process

3.1 List the basic steps that should typically be followed to remove components and materials requiring selective treatment:

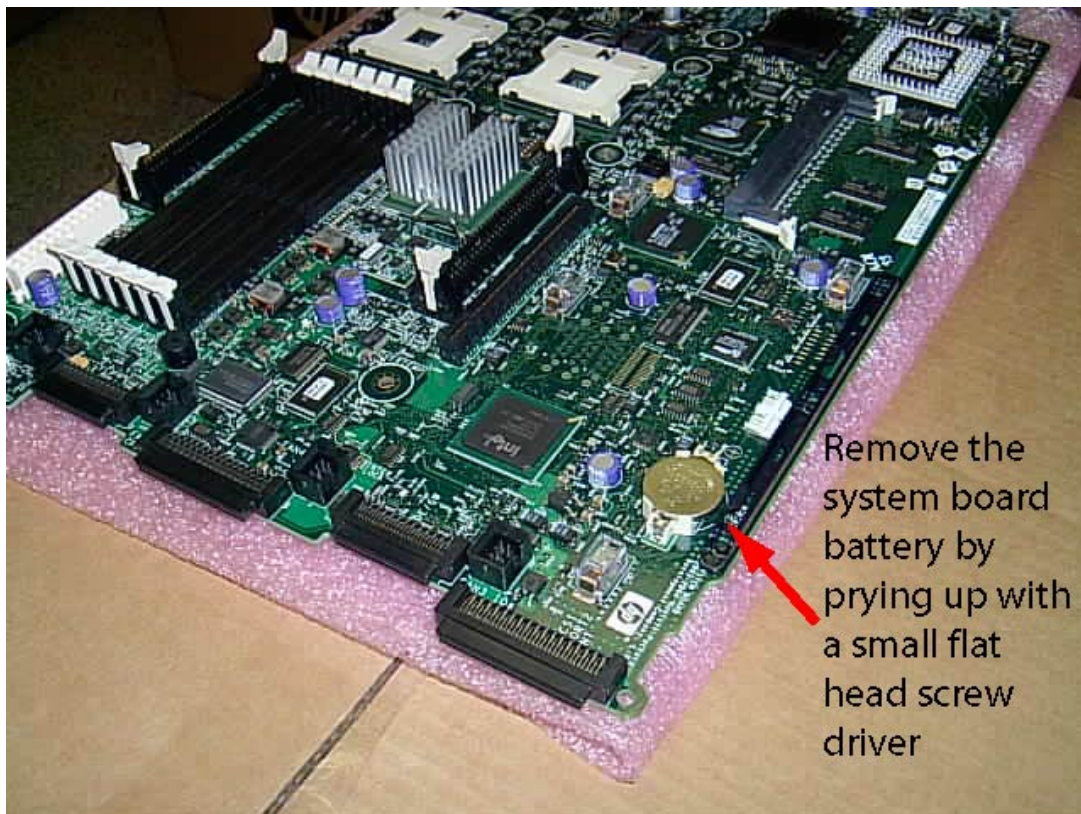
1	System Board Battery – Remove the top cover and locate the battery on the system board. With a small flat head screw driver remove the battery and discard properly.
2	2.5CM Capacitors – Remove the power supply(s) from the system. With #2 Philips screw driver remove the screws securing the top cover then locate the capacitors and pry from the PCB with a large flat head screw driver and discard properly.

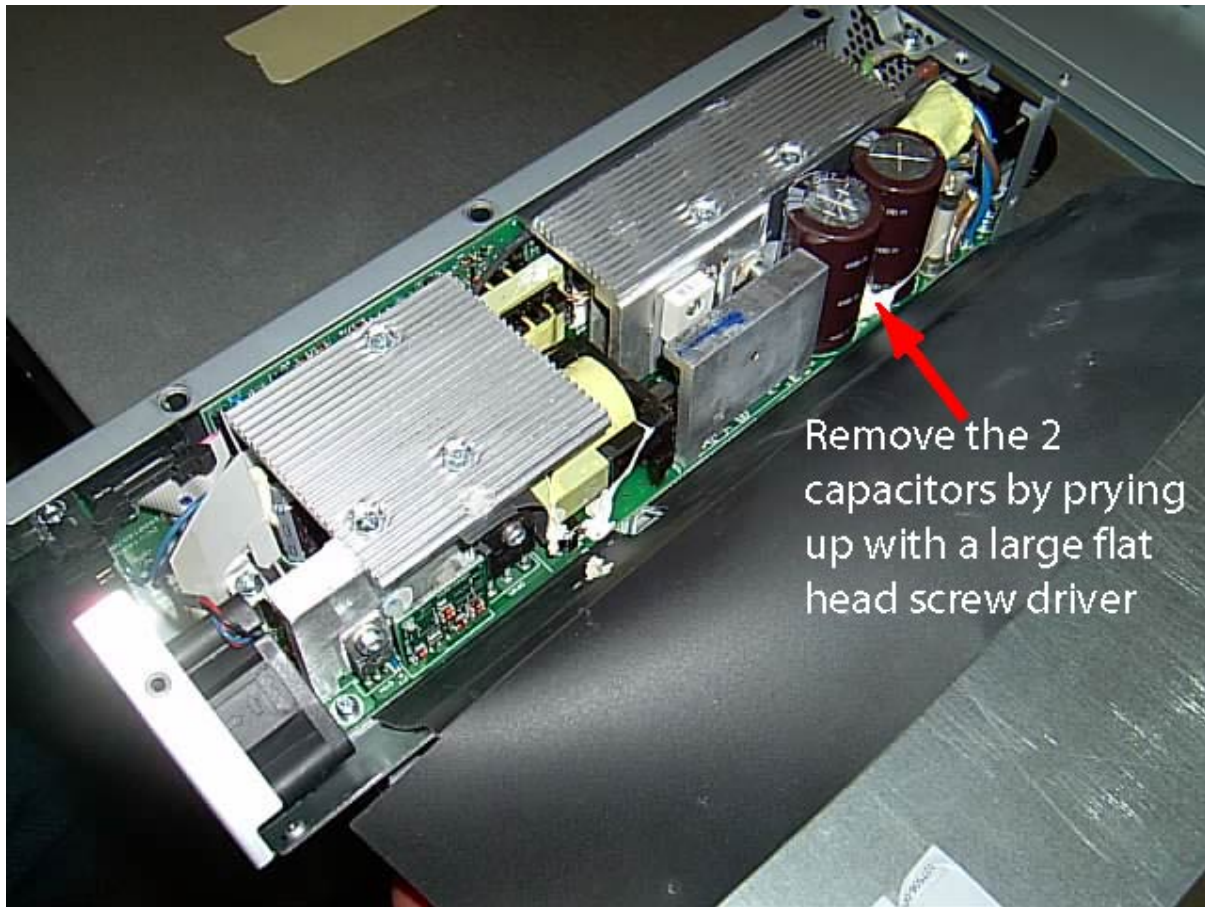
